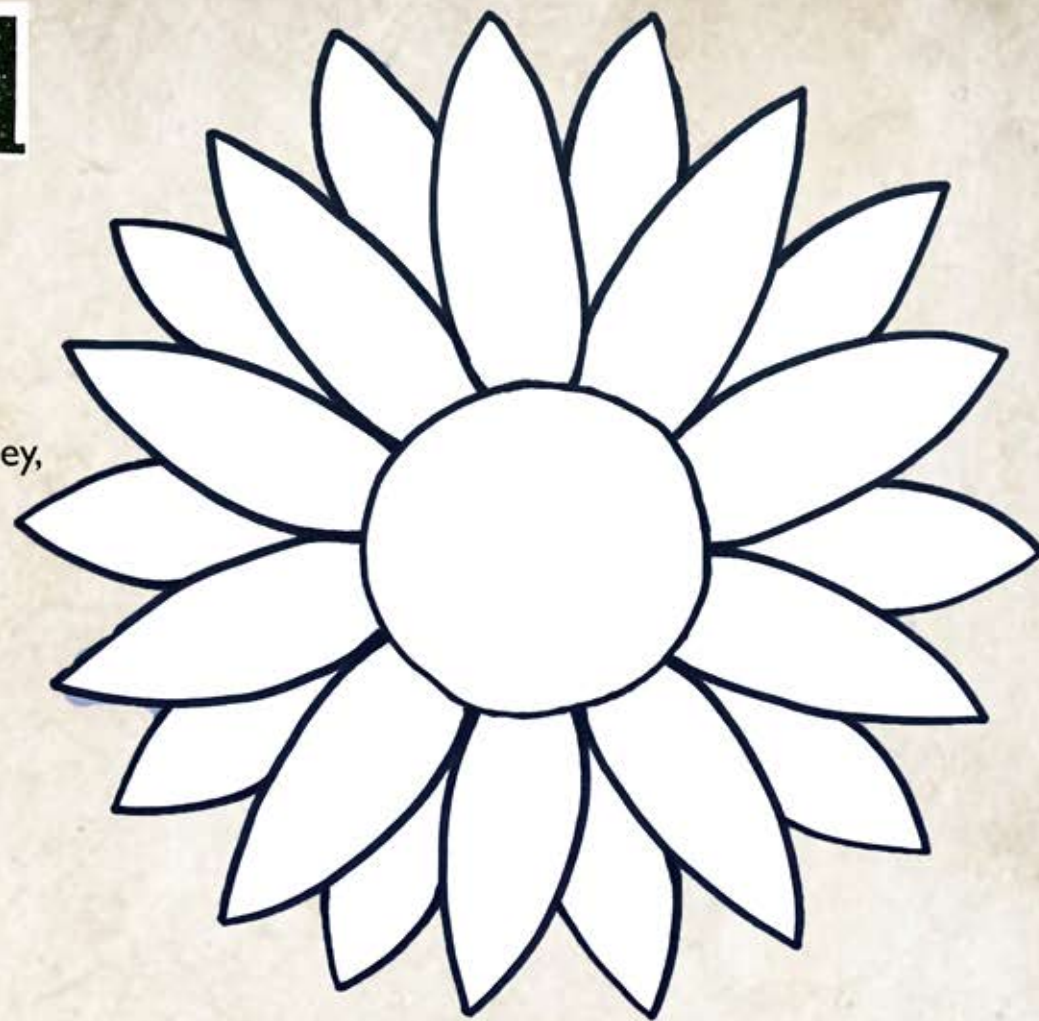
Flower Trail
